

Types of Attributions


◆ **Attribution**: Inferences that people make about the _____ of behavior.



Fundamental Attribution Error

- ◆ Tendency to _____estimate dispositional factors and underestimate situational factors when forming attributions.
- ◆ Actor-observer effect:
 - Actor: Tend to use **situational** attributions to explain our _____ behavior.
 - Observed: Tend to use **dispositional** attributions to explain the behavior of ______.
 - Occurs for many reasons:





Just-World Hypothesis
Belief that people get the outcomes they ""
Leads to a type of dispositional attribution called victim-blaming.
